Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities is the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I am grateful that you've selected me to represent you in the Maine Senate. I am honored that you've put your trust in me and I will continue to work tirelessly for the betterment of you and your neighbors, as well as for the great State of Maine. Please let me provide you with a recap of the first session of the 127th Legislature as well as my hopes for the second session, which began in January 2016.

One of the most important items on our to-do list is clear: our state needs more jobs at all levels of the pay scale, so it is our responsibility and my solemn promise to work to expand economic opportunity for all Mainers. To this end, my fellow legislators and I accomplished a great deal during the first session of the 127th Legislature.

We passed a biennial budget that ensured that more Maine families received a tax cut than did in the "largest tax cut in Maine history" in 2011. That same budget stopped taxes on military pensions, so those who have given all that a person can give can feel welcomed and at home in our state. We restructured portions of our welfare system, increasing funding for nursing homes, and put far more funding towards eliminating waitlists for services for brain-injured and intellectually disabled Mainers.

I'm really looking forward to watching how the significant changes we've already made will better the everyday lives of Mainers. I wanted to serve in Augusta because I believe that, while I'm here, I can have an impact on the direction of our district and state. Because of this belief, passing vital legislation (and, sometimes, stopping bad legislation) has remained one of my top priorities.

As you know, more changes are necessary. In 2016, during the second session of the legislature, we need to make progress towards addressing the cost of energy in this state. There are a number of bills that have been proposed that would change the way our state's energy system works, and I look forward to putting my support behind legislation that would lower your energy costs. I also believe that working to provide support to areas hard-hit by recent mill closings should be a focus of the 2016 session. Fighting the war of drugs here in Maine will also be a top priority for lawmakers and myself. Several bills have been proposed that will aid officers in combating the drug epidemic taking place in Maine. We must come together and attack this epidemic through stronger enforcement, appropriate education and effective rehabilitation. I am sponsoring one of the several bills this session to address this serious problem.

To the Residents of Cutler.

I want to begin by thanking you for reaching out to me over the past year. It is a great honor to serve you in the Maine House of Representatives, and I look forward to doing so for many years to come. As a firm believer in local control, and grassroots government, each of you who have taken the time to call, write, or email – whether it's regarding a bill you support, oppose, want me to put in, or even something you just want to fill me in on or need help with – are giving me the energy to keep working hard for Washington County at a time when so much of government is out of touch with the people it serves.

I am also extremely blessed to be a part of the Washington County delegation. Every single member – Senator David Burns, Reps. Robert Alley, Rich Malaby, Joyce Maker, Beth Turner, and I – are friends and colleagues first, and work together to make sure Washington County has a say. Even when we disagree, we encourage each other, push one another, and share information with one another that we can then bring back to you all. And really, that's what being a part of the Legislature is all about: doing the best you can for the people you serve.

On that note, I wanted to touch on a few things you might be interested in.

First, we passed a two-year budget that honors an agreement the State made with small towns like ours over 40 years ago by preserving revenue sharing at current levels. We also increased K-12 school subsidies by \$80 million in an attempt to offset local property taxes, while eliminating taxes on military pensions, and lowering the income tax rate by the largest percentage in history. Yes, it was contentious. No, not everyone agreed with the end result, but every legislator had ample time to review the final proposal and weigh the pros and cons before voting. And in the end, both parties put the best interests of Maine ahead of a crazy, never-tried-before scheme that would have hurt our towns, schools, property taxpayers, elderly, disabled, and everyday Mainers like you.

The Legislature has also tackled the drug crisis. Earlier this year we unanimously passed an anti-drug bill that steps up efforts to crack down on drug dealers, provides resources for treatment and recovery, and educates young Mainers about the dangers of drug abuse. Additional legislation to crack down on drug importation, develop peer support networks in Aroostook & Washington counties, and invest in youth education efforts are also on the docket, while faith-based rehabs like Arise Addiction Recovery in Machias may also garner another look by lawmakers.

I want to close with a special note to our fishermen and their families. I owe you all a huge debt for teaching me so much about your industry, I am not a fisherman. I've never hauled a trap, dug clams, or dragged scallops. Nor am I going to pass legislation that impacts your livelihood without listening to what you think beforehand. You all have been more than generous with me, and have been a huge help. Thank you for that, and for making "herring choker" a buzzword!

To the Citizens of Washington County January 2016

The first year of my administration has been full of many challenges and opportunities, but building relationships has been at the center of the major successes that we are proud to celebrate.

During the early fall of 2015, questionnaires were sent to each town in Washington County asking what we could do to better serve the residents. There was an impressive response rate, with all but two or three towns returning the questionnaires. Using the information we gathered, we have explored what the Sheriff's Office can do for the county's citizens. One of the clear requests was for more coverage. We have budgeted for an additional full-time patrol position, which would bring our roster to eleven full-time deputies. We feel this is a great beginning to building our relationships with each town.

In the past, we have had a strong collaboration with the MDEA. We improved our cooperative abilities this year by assigning a second deputy to work with the MDEA in Washington County. In 2015, we assisted in numerous drug investigations, including the discovery of a meth lab in Wesley. We value a continued joint-effort approach to addressing drug issues in our communities.

Besides working with communities and other agencies, we have also worked to renew leadership relationships. I was very happy this year to participate in the Maine Sheriff's Association annual meeting. I also met with the leadership of all law enforcement agencies within the county and discussed how we could assist them. I found this meeting valuable, and I anticipate facilitating a follow-up meeting.

Thank you for your essential support during my first year. I look forward to my second year of serving you.

Municipal officials are pleased to announce that the **Town of Cutler** has received a \$590 dividend check from the Maine Municipal Association as a result of its good loss experience and loss prevention programs.

The Maine Municipal Association offers three self-funded pools for municipal and quasipublic entities in Maine: the Workers Compensation Fund formed in 1978, the Property & Casualty Pool formed in 1987 and the Unemployment Compensation Fund formed in 1978.

The programs are overseen by governing boards of elected and appointed municipal officials. Each year the boards review the programs' loss experience to determine if dividends may be paid. Patricia Kablitz, Director of Risk Management Services for MMA, said more than 78 percent of program participants received a dividend this year for their good risk management practices and loss experience.

This year the Workers Compensation Fund has distributed almost \$650,000 in dividends to participants and the Property and Casualty Pool has paid dividends of nearly \$550,000, for total payments of just under \$1.2 million returned directly to MMA members.

Since 1997, the two programs have returned over \$18.8 million in dividends to participating members. Dear Friends of Cutler:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I cosponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a

I like to think of Maine as a big small town – and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS ANNUAL REPORT

It is with great pride that I report to the citizens of Cutler the state of the Bay Ridge Elementary School. The administrators, teachers and support staff all work diligently every day to meet the educational needs of all students that attend the Bay Ridge School.

During the 2015/2016 school year, Principal Darlene Wheeler has provided the necessary support that teachers and support staff need to be successful meeting the social and academic needs of our students. Ms. Wheeler stays in touch with the challenges teachers face every day by teaching half of the school day. This is just one example of how she goes above and beyond to meet the educational needs of the Bay Ridge Elementary student body.

During the 2015/2016 school year our administrators and teachers worked together to develop a Comprehensive Teacher Evaluation System that is required by the State of Maine. The teachers took an active role in the development of the evaluation system. I believe the new evaluation system will enable administrators to enhance their support of the important work teachers do every day. The evaluation system is supported by a software system that is based on Robert Marzano's Principles of Teaching.

As many of you know, the Cutler high school students have school choice. Traditionally most of the students attend Washington Academy with some students attending Machias Memorial High School. Warrant Article 1 in the school budget contains the cost of providing regular education services at the Bay Ridge School, as well as, secondary tuition costs. Secondary tuition costs will comprise almost 50% of this budget article.

The proposed 2016/2017 school budget reflects no increase in the tax commitment for education even though secondary tuition costs increased by \$46,356.00. The School Committee added \$46,389.24 from fund balance to keep the tax commitment flat.

It is always a pleasure to work with the Cutler School Committee members. School Committee members Melanie Fergerson, Anita McKinley and Renee Patterson continue to provide the necessary support to the Cutler School Department to ensure that it operates effectively and efficiently. I thank all three School Committee members for their dedicated service to the School Department.

I must also thank the Cutler Selectmen for their steadfast support of the Bay Ridge Elementary School. They always stand ready to help the school.

ARTICLE 01: To choose, by written ballot, a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLES FOR TOWN OF CUTLER SCHOOL BUDGET

ARTICLE 02: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$612,328.30 for Regular Instruction?

ARTICLE 03: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$178,705.78 for Special Education?

ARTICLE 04: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$3,012.00 for Other Instruction?

ARTICLE 05: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$700.00 for Student and Staff Support?

ARTICLE 06: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$41,610.38 for System Administration?

ARTICLE 07: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$47,396.79 for School Administration?

ARTICLE 08: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$46,680.64 for Transportation and Buses?

ARTICLE 09: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$149,008.11 for Facilities Maintenance?

ARTICLE 10: Shall the Town be authorized to expend \$65,458.41 for All Other Expenditures?

ARTICLES 11 THROUGH 12 RAISE FUNDS FOR THE PROPOSED SCHOOL BUDGET

ARTICLE 11: Shall the Town appropriate \$869,807.10 for the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and shall the Town raise \$589,300.00 as the Town's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15688?

Explanation: The Town's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act is the amount of money determined by state law to be the minimum amount that a municipality must raise in order to receive the full amount of state dollars.

ARTICLE 12: (Written ballot required) Shall the Town raise and appropriate \$212,704.07 in additional local funds, which exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services allocation model by \$192,440.92 as required to fund the budget recommended by the school committee?

The school committee recommends \$212,704.07 for additional local funds and gives the following reasons for exceeding the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model by \$192,440.92: The Cutler School Department budget is over the Essential Programs and Services model in student to teacher ratios, school administration, system administration, maintenance, clerical costs, and the difference between the secondary tuition rate and the EPS tuition rate. In addition, the Essential Programs and Services model does not fully fund co-curricular activities and the model has not been fully funded by the State.

Explanation: The additional local funds are those locally raised funds over and above the Town's local contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act that will help achieve the Town budget for educational programs.

ARTICLE 13 SUMMARIZES THE PROPOSED SCHOOL BUDGET

ARTICLE 13: Shall the Town authorize the school committee to expend \$1,144,900.41 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016 and ending June 30, 2017 from the Town's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act, non-state-funded school construction projects, additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, unexpended balances, tuition receipts, state subsidy and other receipts for the support of schools?
